Working Class Women

Revolutionary Women

- Emma Goldman. June 17, 1869-Mary 14, 1940. Anarchist who illegally distributed birth control, encouraged men not to register for the draft, and inciting riots. She is credited with helping develop anarchistic theory in the 20th century.
- Rosa Luxemburg. March 5, 1871-January 15, 1919. Marxist who cofounded the Spartacus Campaign and openly criticized democratic socialism.
- Angela Davis. January 26, 1944– Present. Communist who was in the Black Panther Party in the 1960s. She is a co-founder of Critical Resistance and works to abolish the prison industrial complex.
- Claudia Jones. February 15, 1915– December 24, 1965. Communist who worked diligently to fight in favor to increase the female presence in marxism.
